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GCS as Mission Work

Much has happened in the past 6 months, so we have a lot of updates to let you know about. We'll try to keep it brief, but we're so excited about what's going on that we want to tell you all of it! As you keep reading you'll hear about how our students are doing (quite well), the new advisory council, and some changes that have happened at HST.

Underlying much of this year has been the uncertainty about what will happen next with COVID. Things seemed to be improving, but now they're getting worse again, and it's hard to tell what will happen from here. That uncertainty is uncomfortable.

The good news is, the work of GCS can largely continue unaffected by lockdowns and outbreaks. There are some difficulties (we talked in the last newsletter about students taking Advanced Theological Research in Memphis, and how HST has been working with them to ensure their studies are not hindered by their inability to take ATR), but they can largely be overcome.

In the meantime, the work of our students in their countries continues. We aren't waiting for visa approvals to travel to Nigeria to minister to the church—Jasper already lives there. The same for Australia, Bolivia, Ghana, Switzerland, and Ukraine. These ministers are continuing their training in spite of COVID. They are continuing their ministry in spite of COVID. They are doing God's work in their countries in spite of COVID, in ways no American missionary could.


This is one of the strengths of GCS—we connect churches with ministers who are on the ground, who are already working but nevertheless want to improve their ministries. No travel necessary. No survey trips, no language learning, no cultural adaptation, no colonizing evangelism. Just empowering our brothers and sisters abroad so they can be better prepared to do the work God has called them to.

Traditional mission work is important, and in many ways GCS is standing on the shoulders of it. We want to honor the work of traditional missionaries. But at GCS our mission is not to re-plant where has already been planted; our mission is to empower what is already growing, so that it might grow more and more.

Student Updates



Global Christian Studies aims to direct and help national leaders in churches of Christ to obtain a graduate degree in order to enhance their role in serving God's kingdom. The clearest picture of our effort revolves around our current students and their efforts to obtain the degree.

Ubong took Global Evangelism under Alan Howell. They discussed cross cultural communication, short term missions and other useful aspects of Christian Ministry. Ubong, who lives in Nigeria said, "This class really impacted my ministry in Nigeria."

Edmundo was in Managing Conflict in Ministry by Dr Carlos Gupton. He said the class was "transformational," and has already used the class to deal with some local conflict in Bolivia.

Nathan was in class with Edmundo. He said, "I love studying at HST." He also added his wife Katrina has health issues and asked us to pray for them. They live in Australia.

This spring **Justin** completed the class Advanced Introduction to the Old Testament with Lance Hawley. Justin noted, "I found the in-depth study of select texts in Genesis and the thematic and structural overviews of the books of the Pentateuch to be... insightful and useful for ministry..." Justin works with French speaking Switzerland.

Nancy took the class on Biblical Preaching with Dr Bland. Nancy concluded, "I definitely feel this course has helped me prepare for being able to teach women in a class or workshop." Nancy lives in Australia.

Jasper took Hebrew poetry with Lance Hawley. Jasper, who is from Nigeria, noted, "This class has enriched my understanding of the poetic section of the Old Testament as well as developed in me a flair for Hebrew poetry scholorship."

Valery completed Spiritual and Theological Formation with Dr. Gupton. Valery said, "I learned how to take care of my spiritual life, how to stay faithful in my faith walk and ministry. I also learned of different ways churches are organized and run." Valery is from Ukraine.


Vitaliy, who is from Kiev, said, "I had a good experience with my first course at HST. I believe that it will be very helpful in this ministry."

Renewal Through Restoration by Benny Tabalujan



From Our Students

An interview with Nancy Wu Won

Why are you working on a degree at HST?

I have been asked to teach a ladies' Bible class in the past and felt very inadequate. When the opportunity arose to gain a degree through HST, it looked like a good idea so I can be better equipped to teach and encourage growth in my sisters in Christ.



What is your family background (parents, grandparents), and how have they affected your faith?

I'm an Australian born Chinese. My parents were born in southern China and immigrated to Australia in the 1950s and 60s. My paternal and maternal grandparents also left China due to the communists. My paternal grandmother was a very devout Buddhist and my father followed suit. Consequently, when my older sister and I became Christians, my dad was very angry. Despite the persecution, my sister and I have remained steadfast. Perhaps withstanding the anger has strengthened us in some way.

Where do you live, and what is your neighborhood/city like?

I live in Melbourne, which is the capital city of the state of Victoria, Australia. We have about 4 million people here. It's a very multicultural city. It's reflected at Belmore Rd Church of Christ as we have over 12 different nationalities represented. Melbourne is known for its arts and cultural precincts.

What is your strongest quality?

That's a good question. I'm not sure how to answer that. I like to laugh and see the best brought out in others. You might have to ask my friends as to what they think my strongest quality is.

What has your church experience been like?

My sister introduced me to the Church of Christ and after studying the Bible on how to become a Christian, I made the decision that I would be faithful. God has blessed me wherever I have gone. I have lived in 4 states of Australia and have always found God's people to be warm and inviting. I have been the beneficiary of God's grace through others and this has spurred me on to want to pass this on to others. I have always loved the a capella singing and singing plays a big role in sustaining my faith.

Are you married? Tell us about your spouse.

I am single. When I visited HST at the beginning of 2020, the visiting students were asked to stand up and introduce themselves. I told them that I was married to Jesus! We all laughed!

What have you most enjoyed about being at HST?

I have enjoyed the insights gained through studying at HST. Working full time and studying part time is intense. When I am not working as a physical therapist in a rehab hospital, then I am studying. It feels like just about every waking moment is consumed by thoughts of reading, studying, thinking, and meditating on God and His word. It's intense! This intensity draws me closer to God and I am amazed at the insights that I get because of this process of studying at HST. I feel God reveals things about myself that need the light of His presence. It's a privilege to study in this way and have many giants of faith pray for me. I am humbled by this privilege.

What class are you taking next?

My next class is Introduction to the New Testament. Dr Alan Black is teaching this.

How do you see the degree helping you in ministry?

I see this degree helping me serve women in particular. I've just taken Biblical Preaching with Dr Bland and the skills learned in that class will help me prepare lessons for my sisters in Christ. I continue to pray for God's guidance as to where He wants me to serve.

Tell about a recent sermon you preached or class you taught or a person you served

I had to prepare 2 ten-minute sermons for my last class. Having never preached before, I felt like I was in the wrong class. My other brothers in the class had all preached and I felt like I had no idea! Scary! Praise God, He came to my rescue. Dr Bland showed us some principles, I listened intently to my brothers as they preached, and I scurried around finding resources to help me understand the process of writing a sermon. I was able to deliver a sermon on Psalm 23 with lots of God's help.

What do you think about GCS?

Global Christian Studies is a great concept. Although I don't see all that goes on, I am confident that God is using the faithful people who are supporting this endeavor to further the work of the kingdom by assisting others to grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ so that His purposes are realized on this earth.

Why should others consider GCS?

If you are considering studying through the assistance of GCS, then I would say, 'Do it!' It's a rich experience; an experience where you find out more about God and yourself.

Do you have a word of encouragement for our donors?

Thank you to all our GCS donors. May God bless you for your generosity in helping to further His kingdom. I feel very blessed to be the recipient of such help.

Report from the new Dean at HST

Dr. Mark Powell took on the role of Dean at Harding School of Theology on July 1. Dr. Powell is Professor of Theology. He teaches courses in Christian theology, ethics, and philosophy of religion. His research and writing interests include the doctrine of the Trinity, religious epistemology, and theology in the Stone-Campbell Movement.

Mark has served in preaching ministry, urban ministry, and adult education, and he is currently a shepherd at a church in Memphis. He is deeply interested in the intersection of theological scholarship, the ministry of the church, and discipleship.



Mark and his wife, Debbie, have three children. He enjoys sports, cooking barbecue, camping, and spending time with his family.

Dr. Powell recently wrote this statement to GCS supporters:

"The majority of Christians no longer live in the West, but in Africa, Asia, and Latin America. An important next-step in global evangelism is the training of indigenous Christian leaders who will preach the gospel, plant churches, and establish Christian schools and other organizations. Harding School of Theology is honored to partner with Global Christian Studies to provide the highest level of ministry training for global leaders. Training global leaders is hard work, and we anticipate challenges, but HST is committed to doing this work right. I take HST's partnership with GCS to be a key part of our future work."

Financial Report for January to June 2021

GCS had a total of ten different students during the spring of 2021. Revenue for those students totaled \$16,225. Most of our income comes in August for each year. Expenses for students during the half year was \$15,647,10.

GCS asks donors to contribute the entire cost of a student's education during a five-year period, even though the students may take six to eight years to complete the degrees. This allows GCS a steady cash flow and assures students of funding for their degrees.

Administrative costs were just over \$11,000 for the two part time staff, fund raising, and web site costs. GCS expects the administrative portion of the total expenditures to remain fixed while student expenses will rise. The two GCS overseeing congregations provide all the administrative costs, so all money donated to students goes directly to their education.

Message to Potential Students

GCS seeks students from around the globe who live outside the US, who have an accredited bachelor's degree, and have the full recommendation of their local congregation. The process of being accepted by GCS and enrolling in a US school takes about four months. Students who attend HST can do all their work online (high speed internet is required), but must take the course Advanced Theological Research on site in Memphis. GCS pays the student's expenses for this Memphis trip.

The total cost of an accredited graduate degree in Bible or ministry is about \$50,000. HST provides a generous scholarship, GCS donors give \$5,000 per year for five years, and the student is required to contribute \$2,600 toward their degree.
